PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Planning for the Future

As we began the 2017-2018 school year, we celebrated the **Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary** with an all-school liturgy. It was a beautiful Mass. Dr. Mindy (Lankert) Ernstberger '74, principal, delivered the Call to Worship and set the tone for Father Adam Ahern's homily. Dr. Ernstberger reminded us that

Providence is Our Lady's school. We are here to serve Her students, and with Her guidance, lead our students to Her Son, Our Lord Jesus Christ. It was a simple, yet very profound message that captured not only the spirit of this holy day, but also the spirit of the tradition that was begun on Sept. 12, 1951.

Some 66 years later, Blue Pride is strong. As school began this year, we welcomed 114 freshmen, the Class of 2021, into the Pioneer family. This is the largest class on campus and represents a 20 percent increase in enrollment over the previous year. We have active marketing and enrollment activities underway already as we look forward to greeting Future Pioneers. Stabilizing and building enrollment is a critical feature of our new three-year strategic plan.

Our **2017 – 2020 Strategic Plan** has four hallmarks of a quality Catholic school as its foundation: 1) Mission and Catholic Identity, 2) Academic Excellence, 3) Leadership and Governance and 4) Operational Vitality. These four pillars mark our goals and objectives. Furthermore, the PHS school leadership links each of our annual performance metrics to these same goals and objectives to assure alignment to our individual roles and accountabilities. At

each of our Board of Trustees meetings, we will measure and track our performance to these goals and objectives, record our progress, and adjust course as necessary.

Our enrollment marketing activities are focused on our Mission and Catholic Identity goals. A recently completed financial audit, part of our Leadership and Governance efforts, went very well. Our financial house is in order, and we remain debt-free with a growing endowment.

To satisfy some of our Academic Excellence initiatives, the Class of 2017 posted \$8.5 million in college scholarships while logging more than 10,000 hours of community service. Our students also earned more than 1,600 college credits through AP and dual-credit courses. We continue to make progress with our 1:1 technology improvements and focus on 21st Century Learning Skills.

Finally, Operational Vitality is always on the agenda. We work tirelessly to assure our housekeeping and curb appeal are impeccable. A new student activity bus has been added to assure reliable transportation, and the older vehicles are freshly serviced, cleaned, and inspected. As a newly added safety measure, more than 30 of our faculty and staff completed mini-bus safety training, led by Ben Hornung '75. Many of those same drivers also hold Red Cross CPR and AED certification.

And you thought we just taught school. Hardly! While our focus is on educating the whole child spiritually, academically, emotionally, and physically, we also work on strategic initiatives to preserve and promote the PHS legacy. As always, we thank you for your generosity and stewardship of time, talent and treasure.

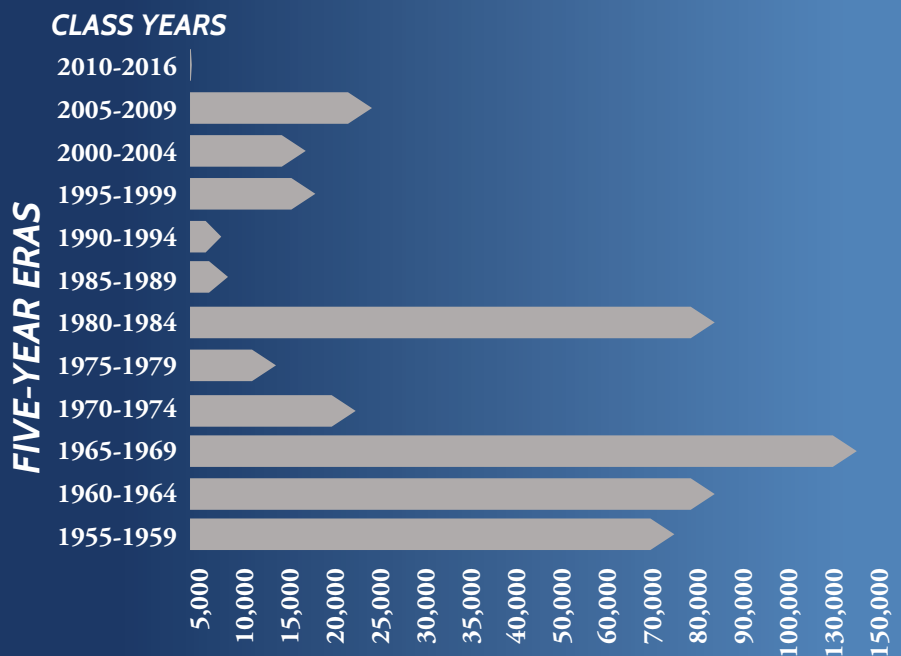

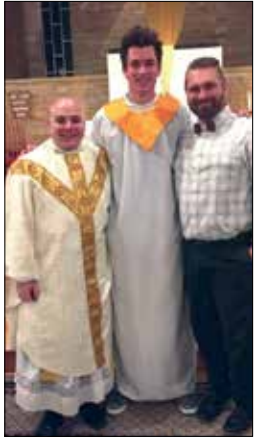

The Value of a Providence Education: Spiritual Development



Certainly, parents choose Providence because of its college- and life-prep programs. Students, teachers and parents often use the terms *family* and *community* to describe us. Yet another reason

is the education of the whole student, most specifically, the student's spiritual side.

Providence students take eight semesters of theology, exploring topics from the sacraments to social justice. Students develop a commitment to helping others by recording at least 60 service hours volunteered off campus. And campus ministry programming provides opportunities for daily morning liturgy, weekly Rosary, monthly Eucharistic Adoration, and all-school liturgies.

Father Adam Ahern is one of two full-time high school chaplains in the archdiocese and adds more faith experiences for Providence students. Being

present on campus, he can celebrate daily Mass each morning and offer the Sacrament of Reconciliation on a weekly basis. He chooses to dress in his cassock and is a daily witness to our faith. He also is a big sports fan and is in the stands alongside our students cheering on many of our sports teams.

Providence also offers a retreat experience designed for each grade level. Our freshman retreat includes team building and witness talks, and sophomores take part in an immersive social justice experience. Our juniors take an overnight retreat to foster class unity and leadership as the class prepares for senior year. And seniors elect to take part in a four-day Christian Awakening retreat that helps them deepen their faith and relationship with God.

The spiritual formation at Providence helps prepare our students for living as adult Christians. For a few, that formation carries forward into exploring a priestly vocation. Father Kyle Rodden '07 is an associate pastor at St. Monica Parish in Indianapolis and our youngest alumni priest. Geoffrey Mooney '05 is in his second year as a temporarily professed seminarian at Moreau Seminary with the Congregation of Holy Cross at the

University of Notre Dame.

Providence also has had three teachers and a student choose to become Catholic in part due to their experience here. Dawson Mitchell '17 was baptized in April 2017 at Our Lady of Perpetual Help, where he attended grade school. He occasionally went to a Christian church with his grandparents on Sundays, and his great grandmother was Catholic. But he never really thought about becoming Catholic himself, he said. His senior retreat changed all that.

Before the retreat, he did appreciate that his friends were part of a faith community and the support it provided, he said. His own faith had begun to deepen after recovering from a knee injury during his junior year, but it wasn't until he took part in the senior retreat that he saw Mass as a spiritual experience he enjoyed and wanted to take part in.

After retreat, he began attending morning Mass at Providence on a regular basis and enrolled in RCIA classes at OLPH. After his Baptism, First Communion, and Confirmation, he truly appreciated the well-rounded experience at Providence.

"I've gotten more out of it than just education," he said.



LEADERSHIP & GOVERNANCE

The Value of a Providence Education: A PK-12 Catholic School

Providence serves as the high school for the New Albany Deanery parishes, especially the seven Deanery grade schools, allowing for Catholic education from preschool to eighth grade in Clark, Floyd and Harrison counties. Providence offers many opportunities for Deanery students to connect with the high school and feel part of the community. Here are some of the ways Deanery students take part in Providence activities:

Theatre:

- More than 500 students grades kindergarten through fifth attended a school day matinee performance of *Cinderella: Or How Pipsqueak the Mouse Became a Stallion*, performed by PHS freshman and sophomore students
- Nearly 60 students from many of our Deanery schools were in the cast and crew of *Alice in Wonderland Jr.*

STEM:

- Annual STEM summer camps for students entering grades one through nine interested in science, technology, engineering, and math with 82 attending and 19 on a waiting list in summer 2017.
- STEM Club, which offers various after school STEM activities, lessons, and experiments to 108 students grades one to nine in its first year.

Athletics:

- Several hundred Deanery students learned from Providence coaches and players during various summer athletic camps, from soccer to basketball
- PHS Cheer team hosted two clinics for more than 100 Deanery cheerleaders during the football and basketball seasons
- Several hundred Deanery students gathered at PHS for various Deanery Night celebrations in sports from

volleyball to football, with football teams from the New Albany Deanery scrimmaging on Gene Sartini Field under the Friday night lights

- Various Deanery athletic teams competed on Providence courts and fields, including championship tournaments, from baseball and track to tennis

Academics:

- More than 60 middle school students from seven Deanery schools took part in the annual Deanery Academic Olympics
- Thirty-five middle school students from six Deanery schools (including Providence Junior High) competed in the annual Deanery Science Fair, hosted at Providence
- Nearly 45 students from the Deanery schools competed in the annual Deanery Art Fair, hosted at Providence

The Value of a Providence Education: A Head Start and Money in the Bank

Choosing Catholic high school education is an investment – in the student’s spiritual, emotional, and academic development. The money spent for this high school education does pay off, with our students prepared for college. Each year, more than 95 percent of our seniors enroll in an undergraduate program, and many of them enter with several college credits.

Our seniors take advantage of dual-credit, Advance College Project, and Advanced Placement courses that can allow them to enter college as a sophomore. Those credits enable our alumni to pursue a double major, making them more marketable once they earn their bachelor’s degree. Over the last several years, at least two alumni each year have been able to earn their bachelor’s degree in three years and enter the workforce or graduate school a year before their peers.

Four members of the Class of 2014 earned their degrees in three years: Krystal Graf, who entered Indiana University – Bloomington with 18 credits and earned a degree in business and management; Amelia Voelker, who entered IU Southeast with nine credits and earned her bachelor’s in business management and marketing with a minor in entrepreneurship; Owen Mattingly, who entered IU Bloomington with 18 credits and

earned a degree in accounting and finance; and Ashton Cash, who entered IU Southeast with 30 credit hours and then earned her bachelor’s degree from the Oregon State University ecampus in anthropology.

While entering college with a semester or more’s worth of credits did help these alumni graduate a year early, doing so also required hard work on their part during college. Voelker, who is now an office manager and marketing director for a local recycling company, attended classes year round, taking at least 15 hours each fall and spring. Cash, who is an interpretive naturalist at a local state park and pursuing her master’s in natural resources through Oregon State’s ecampus, took more than 15 hours each trimester at Oregon State.

Mattingly, who is pursuing his master’s degree in accounting from IU Bloomington’s Kelley School of Business, said he saw the financial value in taking 18 credit hours after his first year (during which he was a walk-on for the Hoosiers football team) since tuition is a flat fee for 12 to 18 hours. During his final semester, he also took six credit hours online through Ivy Tech Community College of Indiana plus a four-week class in May in order to graduate in May 2017.

Mattingly said the credit hours he earned

at Providence did help by getting some of his required courses out of the way. But more importantly, he learned skills at Providence that helped him be successful in the IU Kelley School of Business.

“In high school I had new assignments due every day, whereas [at IU] I might only have a few large deliverables due once a week,” Mattingly said. “Since I was used to working on small assignments daily in high school, I’ve been able to have the discipline to work on projects throughout the week rather than trying to cram all the work in the night before something is due. I’ve still had times where I was up all night finishing a project at the last minute, but generally I’ve been able to balance my workload throughout the week.”

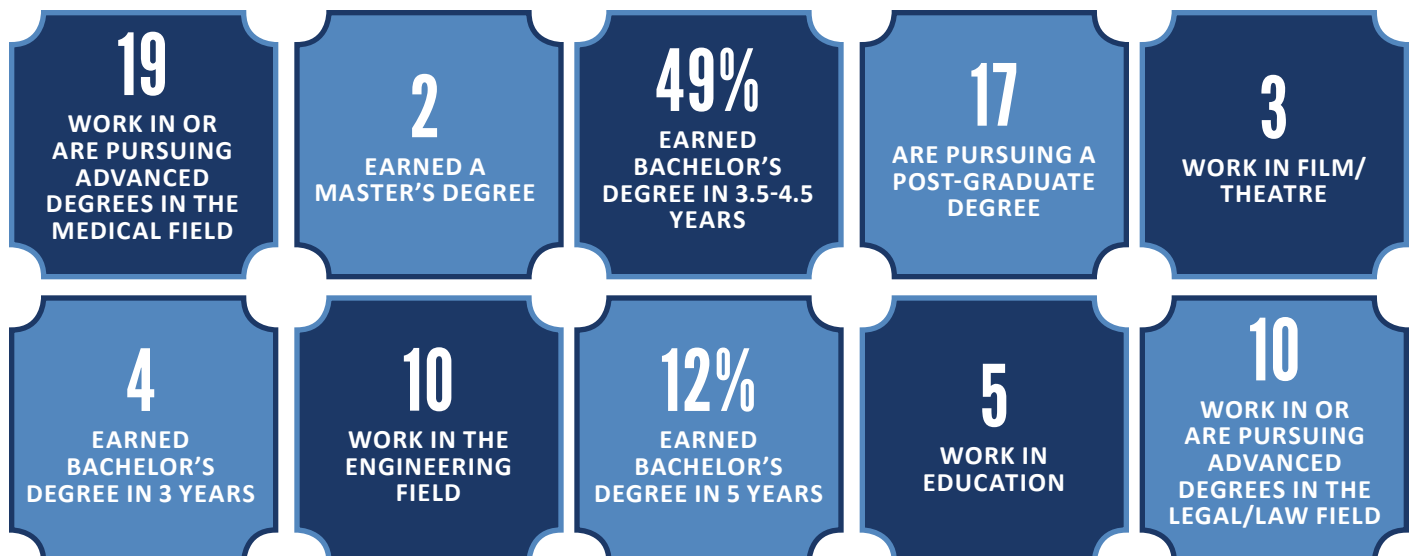
But the most valuable skills were learning how to learn.

“The critical thinking skills I developed at Providence have been invaluable in helping me solve new problems and approach difficult questions from multiple angles to find solutions,” he said.

After earning his master’s degree in May 2018, Mattingly plans to sit for the CPA exam and in the fall will begin working for a Chicago public accounting firm.
